A watchman's report (Is. 21:6-10)

Be alert! – even when things remain the same (II Peter 3:3-7) – *patient endurance* Babylon has fallen – this was unexpected and unthinkable – *political super-powers*

A watchman's warning (Is. 21:11-12) – prophecy against Edom

How much longer? (Psalm 6) – the believers suffering is always temporary
Having only temporary relief – morning, then night again (Psalm 30:5/II Peter 2:21-22)

Morning & joy is guaranteed for believers – only judgment for unbelievers

A vain attempt (Is. 21:13-16) – prophecy against Arabia

No place to hide (Psalm 139:7-12) – *God sees everything (Hebrews 4:13)*No amount of provisions will last – remember Y2K? – *everything can be destroyed*No place to flee – *you cannot run from facing God's judgment (Philippians 2:9-11)*

A vain search (Is. 22:1-19)

What troubles you? (Hebrews 10:27 / Proverbs 29:5 / I John 4:18) – *misplaced trust*Where are your leaders? (Isaiah 43:10-11) – only God can deliver us – *only 1 Savior*Weeping over Jerusalem (Luke 13:34) – *He wants us to turn to Him*Wrong places to find strength (Psalm 20:6-7) – *be strong in the Lord (Ephesians 6:10)*When sin cannot be atoned for (II Chronicles 36:16 / Matthew 12:22-32) - *unbelief*Worthless leaders disposed (Jeremiah 45:5 / I Corinthians 10:7) – *trusting idols*

A future hope (Is. 22:20-25)

A servant of the Lord (Hebrews 10:7) – *Jesus came to do God's will*A father to those in Jerusalem (Luke 13:34; 23:34 / John 2:16) – *caring about sin*Authority of David – key to his house (Revelation 3:7) – *Jesus holds this key*A seat of honor (Hebrews 2:9; 10:12) – *the highest seat possible (Ephesians 1:20-22)*A peg driven into a firm place (yet even this will be cut off) (II Timothy 4:18 / Jude 24)

Discussion questions for Isaiah 21-22

What is required for us to stay alert? What are we watching for? What can lull us to sleep? (I Peter 1:13; 4:7-8/Ephesians 6:10-13/Acts 20:28-32/II Corinthians 6:14-7:1/Hebrews 10:24-25) Minds renewed by His Word; Hearts renewed by prayer; Clothed with His armor. Beware of false teaching; do not compromise your beliefs; do not forsake meeting together Not addressing sin in our lives; drawn toward worldly things; neglecting time with God and fellowship with other believers

How long will I suffer? How is this question different for a believer than for an unbeliever? (Romans 8:18 / II Corinthians 4:16-18 / Psalm 73:12-20) *The longest a believer will suffer is only the duration of this life. The unbeliever will suffer for eternity.*

Why are all man's effort to create security a vain effort? Should we as believers prepare for future disasters? What is the most important part of our preparation? (Matthew 6:19-21 / James 1:9-11; 5:1-5 / Proverbs 11:4; 20:4; 21:5 / II Corinthians 12:14) — even if your barns are full, life is fragile and everything can be taken away (Luke 12:16-21) We are to prepare, but we should hang on loosely to the things of this world — being willing to use them for God's purpose. Growing in our relationship and trust in Jesus is the most important preparation.

What can lead us as believers to be troubled by things that should not trouble us? What are the things that we should be troubled about? (Philippians 3:18-20/I Peter 2:24/Romans 6:2/I John 3:4-6/Luke 12:4-5/II Thessalonians 1:8-9/II Peter 3:9/Galatians 6:14/I Corinthians 1:30-31)

When our focus is on our own selfish needs — desiring the things of this world. We must be on guard against sin. We cannot let the fear of man control our decisions. We need to be concerned for the lost. The cross and not the world — keeping Jesus as our highest goal.

What sin cannot be atoned for? Can we, as believers, commit such a sin? (Luke 12:10 / John 3:18; 15:26; 16:8-11) To attribute the work of the Holy Spirit to Satan. His work today is to point us to Jesus and convict us of our sin. If we refuse to repent and put our trust in the Savior, we will be judged by the wrath of God (John 3:36)

Where does Scripture lead us to find hope? How can we practically keep this hope alive? (John 10:27-30 / Romans 5:5 / Hebrews 6:18-20 / Colossians 3:1-4) – *My hope is in the Lord!* His love, His Spirit, and His promise are my only hope. We must set our minds and our hearts on things above. His return is our blessed hope.
